Village Receives \$3.5 Million Federal Grant for Biomedical Innovation Center

On September 20, Village staff received notification from the offices of Senators Feingold and Kohl that the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) has awarded a \$3.5 million grant to the Pleasant Prairie Community Development Authority (Authority) for the construction of a regional, biomedical innovation center. The Southeast Wisconsin Innovation Center has been proposed as a regional initiative to spur innovation and the growth of new biomedical companies. The end goal is the creation of additional professionallevel employment opportunities within the regional community. Village President, John P. Steinbrink commented, "We would like to thank the Kenosha Area Business Alliance for their help in securing the funding for this project. We look forward to working with KABA, the EDA and the Universities of Wisconsin-Whitewater and Parkside to create new professional-level job opportunities within the regional community." The Authority and KABA cooperatively prepared an indepth proposal to create the Southeast Wisconsin Innovation Center.

Plans call for the construction of a LEEDcertified, 40,352 square foot building to be built in what will be the

Emergency Messages Sent Through CodeRED System

On the evening of August 31, residents living within a specific area in the Village received a mass emergency message from CodeRED Emergency Notification System. The message was sent to notify nearby residents that police were seeking a man who was possibly armed and to remain in their homes. Two men believed to have weapons fled from officers with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and the Kenosha County Sheriff's Department. Some who received the calls expressed confusion over the word "CodeRED" appearing on their caller identification.

What is CodeRED

CodeRED is a telephone-based, mass emergency notification system used in Kenosha County to notify residents of disasters and emergency events. Sometimes referred to as a reverse 911 call, the service uses an internet mapping capability to target calls by geographic location and then distributes emergency messages directly to telephone numbers of record within the targeted location.

When you receive a CodeRED call, please listen carefully to the message. The message will typically offer a succinct explanation of the situation along with instructions as to how you should respond. Because these messages are sent to enhance public safety, please pay special care to the message.

CodeRED is only one of multiple reverse 911 options available today. In the near future, an alternate service may be utilized within the county in order to share information during an emergency situation, should the need arise again.


Fall Residential Leaf Collection

How to Prepare for Residential Leaf Collection

As a part of the Solid Waste Services provided in the Village, crews collect loose, un-bagged leaves directly from your curb or roadside each fall and spring. This year, Fall Leaf Collection will begin on October 18. In order to have your leaves collected, simply follow the steps below.

- See the Leaf Collection Map at the right and identify your collection zone.
- See the Leaf Collection Schedule to determine your collection date.
- Have loose leaves ready by 7:00 a.m. on your collection dates.
- To prepare your leaves, rake your loose, fallen leaves into a pile at your curb or on your roadside.
- Leaves must be within six feet of the asphalt road to be collected.
- Please keep leaves off of the asphalt.
- For residents with curbs and gutters, please place loose leaves on the grass by your curb.
- For residents with a ditch line, please place loose leaves on the grass along the roadside of the ditch.
- Because leaves are collected with a vacuum, they must be piled loose.
- Bagged leaves or grass and branches will not be collected.

Weather permitting, three rounds of leaf collection will take place this year. If you miss your scheduled collection days,

Village Green Center, a downtown area currently in the design stage that is set at the demographic center of Pleasant Prairie, west of 39th Avenue between Springbrook Road and Highway 165. The floor plan includes office, laboratory and flexible research and development space for entrepreneurs and business startups in the life science, biomedical and biotechnology fields, in addition to space for administrative support services.

The project will offer startups a stateof-the-art facility at a reduced rent, along with shared business support services. "Once the businesses establish themselves, they would move to larger locations or facilities within the regional community," explained Steinbrink. "The concept should not only provide additional jobs, but should help provide area business parks with potential high-quality occupants over coming years." It is anticipated that the innovation center will create over 350 jobs and \$24 million in private leveraged investments over the next ten years. It is unknown which specific businesses will be the first to occupy the Southeast Wisconsin Innovation Center.

Pleasant Prairie recently announced the receipt of a \$70,000 State grant related to the project. In addition to the State and Federal grants, the Authority and KABA would both commit \$2 million towards the success of the project. Pleasant Prairie will work to create a Tax Increment Financing District to fund the Authority's portion of the project costs, in order to keep the financial responsibility for the project off of the residential taxpayers and on the development itself. \square

Pleasant Prairie Welcomes Mondi Akrosil to LakeView Corporate Park

In September, the Village Plan Commission approved Site and Operational Plans for global manufacturer Mondi Akrosil to occupy the former 168,879 square foot, 60-acre Permacel facility, located at 7201 108th Street in LakeView Corporate Park. Mondi Akrosil intends to develop the Pleasant Prairie location as their flagship plant for the manufacture of specialized silicone release liners, an example being the removable backing on stickers and name tags.

The Pleasant Prairie location will compliment the company's existing facilities in Menasha, Wisconsin and Lancaster, Ohio. Mondi, with corporate headquarters in both South Africa and the UK, operates more than 100 plants in over 30 countries worldwide. The company expects to take ownership of the property and begin equipment installation and operations within the next few months. Over time, Mondi expects to employ between 30 and 100 employees at the Pleasant Prairie location. The initial number of employees is expected to be between 10 and 50.


"We are incredibly pleased to welcome Mondi Akrosil to the Village and to LakeView Corporate Park," remarked John P. Steinbrink, Village President. "We look forward to having Mondi Pleasant Prairie as a new corporate citizen and employer and are confident they will enjoy their new home here in the Village."

Highway 165 Improvement Update

During 2009, residents were invited to an open house-style meeting conducted by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) regarding upcoming changes to State Highway 165. Beginning in 2011, Highway 165 will be improved between Springbrook Road (CTH ML) and 39th Avenue (CTH EZ). Plans call for four vehicle lanes, separated by a raised median and complemented by bicycle lanes. *Plans also call for the installation of two roundabouts, one at Springbrook Road and the other at 39th Avenue.*

WisDOT recently received bids for the work to be completed on Highway 165. In preparation for the work that will begin during 2011, stormwater and other utility improvements will be needed. Construction of a stormwater retention pond on the northeast corner of Highway 165 and 39th Avenue is expected to begin yet this fall, while additional utility relocation work is also expected to take place before the end of the year. It is expected that improvements on Highway 165 will be completed near the end of 2011.

WisDOT has been using roundabouts around the State to create slower speeds and fewer conflict points to reduce injury accidents. The WisDOT image you see at the right depicts the traffic flow at a typical roundabout. It offers tips to help travelers become familiar with navigating roundabouts and makes drivers aware of traffic rules associated with them. \square


